



August 3




Aug 31





Helpful Hints - Enroute Communications

Communications that actually work between all Miatas on club drives of course helps to keep the group together and adds to their safety. However, just as important as that, and perhaps more so, is it adds to the drive's fun and also to valuable club member camaraderie. That can be especially so for new club members. An ineffective communications system that's expected to do that but doesn't can easily detract from it. Joining conversations, or effectively being able to actually hear them, while driving along provides an involved group experience rather than an isolated tag-along one as you just follow the car in front of you.

According to numerous sources I've spoken to for quite a variety of reasons, CB radios can do it best, and other types not adequately well. We were interested in trying the FRS radios and felt with their claims of a two-mile range they would prove to be a cost effective means of meeting our objective. Apparently this two-mile range is an ideal theoretical one that's nowhere near achieved in the practical world according to many who have voiced their opinion on Miata.net. The perceived advantage of having a built in antenna restricts their actual Miata to Miata intelligible communications range on line-of-site clear flat terrain is an inadequate one, around a quarter mile and can be less. That's because they too lack adequate antenna ground plane and the car's metal body shields its radiation. FRS radio's range is better when on foot and they can often serve quite well to coordinate Miata groups while out of their car, including while inside nearby small buildings doing things.

The similar but higher cost GRMS radios are more powerful and can communicate further. However, their casual use would be restricted for casual Miata drives by the need to have the required federal FCC license before operating them. Additionally, just like the claimed range for the FRS radios, the claimed GRMS five-mile range is nowhere near achievable from Miata to Miata.

Just as with FRS and GMRS radios, the potential for the much greater CB radio range is also severely limited when attempting to use them with a handheld unit's built-in antenna from inside of a car. Unlike FRS and the similar GMRS radios, a complete antenna system can be connected to CB radios because nearly all of them have provisions for an external antenna that can be placed on the car's exterior metal body (or alternately a properly working CB/AM/FM antenna splitter can use the car's OEM antenna) to provide a complete and full antenna system.

Additionally, most all CB radios, even the low cost ones, have much more powerful audio power that can drive their internal, or external, speaker to volume levels that can be heard by two in the car. CB radios don't need to be expensive at all to be quite effective. Most all of the lower cost CB's have the same 4-watt output power as more expensive ones, and can actually serve better than expensive ones because they typically don't have so many knobs and settings that could be set wrong to prevent communicating as desired.

So what should be do as a club? Ideally, every member could purchase their own CB radio and antenna for club events. This option however, will be met with many objections as members don't which the indulge in the extra expense of purchasing and installing a CB radio, which could range from \$65 - \$300+.

Alternatively we could test the handheld radios some members have with lead, middle & sweep cars in an upcoming cruise to see if they meet our needs. Needless to say this has been done by other clubs but we must prove it to ourselves. So in summary you could say we are still looking into it.



A look at what's happening in the world of Miata

Miatas at the Gap


A road runs right through Deals Gap, North Carolina and it's not just any road, it's U.S. 129. It has made Deals Gap (population 6) world famous. Why, you ask? The road that runs through Deals Gap has 318 turns in just 11 miles and part of the road runs through heavily forested hills along the southwestern border of Great Smoky Mountains National Park. This exceedingly twisty piece of asphalt is also affectionately known as 'The Tail of the Dragon' or, just "The Dragon." Those who have driven it all the way are considered to have "slain the dragon".



Every year there is a Miata event on this route called 'Miatas at the Gap.' What is it? It's like Woodstock for Miatas! It's a big deal. It's a really big deal. There probably isn't a bigger deal, for Miata people, than Miatas at the Gap. It happens every year in late July, this year for the fifteenth time!.

The crowds are getting larger every year, and this year it is estimated over 500 Miatas made the pilgrimage. There is much to do and see as there are organized runs every day, a parade on the Saturday, group photos, BBQs and of course all of the Vendors attend as well. Like we mentioned earlier it's like Woodstock for Miatas.





Spotlight On

2009 20th Anniversary Edition

The year 2009 marked the 20th anniversary of the Miata introduction and to celebrate, Mazda prepared a Special Edition Roadster (as it's called in Japan) for its home market. Like many other recent special-edition models, the 20th Anniversary MX-5 was little more than an appearance package, and a mild one at that. In addition to the requisite 20th Anniversary badging, Mazda added clear fog lamps with bright bezels, 17-inch aluminium wheels, and unique Recaro seats, finished in red leather with black Alcantara inserts.



The following year in February at the Geneva auto show, Mazda marked the Miata's second 20th anniversary - it made its European debut in 1990 - by introducing a 20th Anniversary Limited Edition MX-5 Miata. Only 2,000 anniversary cars were produced and were only available in Europe. This car was based on the 1.8-litre version of the standard MX-5, rather than the higher-powered 2.0-litre, and came with the cloth roof rather than the folding hardtop. This Euro-only version featured stainless-steel door sills with each car's individual number, plus an exterior chrome package that included a new grille surround, door handles, and headlight bezels. Other touches included silver fog-light frames, unique 17-inch wheels, and special 20th-anniversary badges. Colour choices were limited to True Red, Crystal While Pearl, and a new colour, Aurora Blue.

Surprisingly this Anniversary Edition was not made available for sale in North America
